Directions for Using 32Auctions

- 1) Go to https://www.32auctions.com/danishamericancenter
- 2) Choose at the right top of the screen LOGIN
- 3) At the right of the LOGIN button, click create an account account
- 4) At the next screen add your name, email address and create a password. Click all the boxes, that you are legal age, understand the terms of use, understand the private policy and that you are not a robot.
- 5) The site will send you an email to complete your registration. When you get the email click ok and you are registered.
- 6) You can explore all the items on the 32auctions site. Only add your credit card information when you're ready to pay. Remember, you may pay in cash when you pick up your item on March 20th.

DANEBO READING CIRCLE ANTICIPATES SUMMER IN MARCH

Sunday, March 20: 2pm

On Sunday, March 20, the Reading Circle will meet 2-4pm (probably via Zoom) to discuss Tove Jansson's *The Summer Book*. Jansson is perhaps best known for her children books featuring the Moomins, a family of trolls who vaguely resemble hippopotamuses. A talented author and painter, she also wrote ten books for adults. One of Finland's Swedish-speaking minority, Jansson wrote *Sommarboken* in 1972, shortly after the death of her mother. The short novel was translated from Swedish by Thomas Teal and published as a New York Review Books Classic in 2008 as *The Summer Book* (176 pp). Katy Lindblad is the discussion leader.

"Tove Jansson's *The Summer Book* magically evokes the world of childhood in all its wonder and fragility. Sophia, her father, and her grandmother have come to their small island, as they do every summer, and while Papa works, Sophia and Grandmother explore the beaches and bypaths, work in the garden, go swimming, build a model of Venice in the marshes, get a new pet cat, see occasional visitors, and look after each other. This summer is the same as all the rest, and yet different: the old woman is often tired, dizzy, and afraid of losing her walking stick, false teeth, or balance; the young girl is plucky and curious, and trying, in her unspoken, child's way, to come to terms with the fact that her mother has just died." — nyrb classics reading book guide

Jansson spent every summer on such an island in the Finnish archipelago and in her writing evokes a sense of timelessness and intimate contact with nature. A drought threatens newly-introduced plants and must be dealt with. A storm brews on the horizon, then envelops the family's tiny world. So much happens while nothing happens. In April, the month of Hans Christian Andersen's birth in 1805, the Reading Circle will tackle the mammoth biography, Hans Christian Andersen: A New Life, by Jens Andersen (2003, 624pp), translated into English by Circle favorite Tiina Nunnally in 2005. In ten chapters of roughly five- or ten-year spans, the author examines Andersen's life from his Arrival in Copenhagen in 1819 to his death as The Man in the Moon in 1875. There are 36 pages of Notes, an extended Bibliography (10 pages), a 22-page Index, and 30 pages of color and black/white

Illustrations. Michelle Potter-Bacon will guide the group through this "startling, immensely readable, and definitive new biography" that "sheds brilliant new light" (from the publisher, Overlook Duckworth). GENEALOGY ESSAY: DENMARK'S 19TH CENTURY CONCERN FOR AND CARE OF THE POOR AND NEEDY

March 2022

Many of our Danish ancestors left Denmark for the New World to improve their economic lot in life, but many stayed in Denmark and may have lived on very little. NDAGS Treasurer Myra Madsen will explore questions such as: How did key events of the 19th century affect care of the poor? What acts or actions of previous centuries lead to the way in which the less fortunate were treated in the 1800s? How might genealogists today see evidence of poor assistance in their research? How can they interpret this evidence? What is the translation of these terms: almisse, almisselm, plejebarn, fattiglem, fattighuus, fattighjælp? How did attitudes and actions of the 19th century lead to modern treatment of the poor and needy?

Essay will be distributed to NDAGS Members in March in lieu of a live Zoom lecture.

EXCITING DANISH ART NEWS

The 150th Anniversary of *The Danish Pioneer* newspaper is this year. One of the ways the publication's long history is being honored is the silent auction of a beautiful oil painting imported from Denmark. It is donated by Norway Art® Minneapolis. Since 1979, Norway Art has imported art from Scandinavia to the US and Canada.

In 1957, Danish artist Anker Ruff completed "Danish Forest in Mid-Summer." He featured an historic half-timbered building at the edge of a lush forest. With its realistic wildflowers and other vegetation on the forest floor and beech trees, the work of art conveys a restful, summer mood. The oil on canvas painting (22" x 25", signed and dated and framed) is in excellent condition and is valued at \$1,500. Bidding on this work of art will boost funding for *The Danish Pioneer* which will receive all proceeds. The winner will gain a treasure that is a souvenir of an important landmark date in Danish America. A new owner will gain personal enjoyment from having this peaceful painting of summer in Denmark years ago.

To bid, email or send a USPS mail note to Mary Jo Thorsheim in Minneapolis by the April 25 deadline. Include your name, email address, full mailing address, phone number, and your bid. Bids start at \$150 and should be in \$50 increments. Early bids are encouraged.
