DANEBO READING CIRCLE FOLLOWS *THE*PASTOR TO NORTHERN NORWAY IN OCTOBER

DAC's reading group continues the fall discussions on Sunday, October 16, 2-4 pm, with leader Carol Sime and a contemporary novel by Hanne Ørstavik, who is "celebrated throughout the world for her candor and sensitivity to the rhythms of language, and a leading light on the international stage." Written 18 years ago but recently translated into English (2021 by Martin Aitken, 280pp), The Pastor is set in the endless night of an Arctic winter in Norway. Liv, a new, young pastor, is always aware of her failure to connect with people who depend on her in times of tragedy. The relative proximity to the site of an 1852 Sámi uprising against Norwegian settlers allows her to continue her academic investigations into the event. She is looking for an understanding of how Biblical language might have played a role. Yet rather than reaching absolute truths, Liv's narrative is constant speculation and questioning of herself and the power of language.

From publisher Archipelago Book's website: "Liv is fascinated by words and their edges and echoes. As a student of theology in Germany, she researches how the language of the Bible was wielded against the indigenous Sami people during the 1800s. Liv excavates their past and her own, searching for meaning. With each new experience and confrontation, fresh questions about scripture and empathy and who she is arise. She wonders how 'language, in all its plasticity, became so stiff and unbending,' and slowly, she bends it back toward her, building her own vocabulary of healing."

In November, Reading Circle participants will relish Isak Dinesen's *Babette's Feast* in print and, possibly, film. The famous text was published with other stories in 1958 and won the Best Foreign Film Oscar in 1987 (written and directed by Gabriel Axel). A decision on the meeting format and location(s) will be decided at the October session, but the group is currently planning to continue hybrid offerings in the Third Floor Conference Room and on ZOOM. Everyone is welcome to digest the gourmet banquet that mysterious Babette creates for her devout hosts in a Danish village still observing a lifestyle of piety, faith, duty, and self-denial. Will souls be lost to earthly pleasures? Join the Circle on Sunday, November 20, to find out!

November also reveals the results of the 2023 book selection process. Titles, dates, and other details will

appear in the December *DANews* and on bookmarks available on the table outside the DAC Library.

DANISH NATIONAL COSTUMES

"Danish National Costumes" opened on Sunday, September 25 in the DAC art gallery, first floor at DAC. This exhibit showcases a recent gift to DAC from the National Danish-American Genealogical Society and its local chapter featuring a portfolio of 31 turn-ofthe-20th- century Danish costume prints by Frederick Christian Lund. "While taking part in the First Schlesvig War, Lund began to sketch local country people in their best Sunday attire, especially costumes from the first half of the 19th century. As a result of the success of his work and increased interest in the national heritage in 1864 after Denmark had lost Schesvig and Holstein to the Prussians, the State commissioned him to complete drawings of traditional costumes from the other regions of Denmark." (Wikipedia) The project, "Danske National Dragter" led to a publication of colored lithographs in 1864. By 1915 three editions were in publication. This is a rare opportunity to see all the prints in this portfolio on view at once. They highlight traditional costumes from many regions in Denmark. If you know where your family is from in Denmark, you may find clothing your ancestors may have worn. National costumes are not as prevalent in Denmark today as they are in other Nordic countries. Originally all hand sewn, they became more rare once the sewing machine was introduced. You will still find folk dancers wearing traditional dress today.

Wednesday, October 12 & 26: 1pm

The Danebod Folk Meeting experience is a four-day residential event held at the Danebod campus in Tyler, MN. This year marks the 76th anniversary of the meeting and to mark the occasion, four recorded multi-disciplinary lectures and a story hour will be presented at DAC following Onsdag Frokost through November 9. Programs will begin at 1:00 pm or following the luncheon. You do not need to attend the luncheon to attend Danebod Folk Meeting at DAC. This is a free program for DAC Members and guests supported by your free-will donation. Register for each program you are interested in so we can make sure we can accommodate everyone. Wednesday, October 12

Kirsten Olsen, will present, "What the heck is feminism, anyway?"

There is no universally agreed-upon definition of feminism, and that can create a lot of confusion and misunderstanding about a topic that is central to our lives. During our session, we will learn about the sociological study of gender and feminism, have a chance to look at data about people's perceptions of feminism, and learn about how feminism has evolved over time. There may be time for a small group discussion to share our own thoughts and perceptions of feminism. At age 11 months Kirsten attended her first Danebod Family Camp. Since childhood she has been influenced by the Grundtvigian philosophy of life. During college, Kirsten took a semester to study at Den International Højskole in Helsingør, DK. After graduating with a BA in Sociology from the U of M, Morris, she interned at Highlander Research and Education Center (formerly Highland Folk School) and eventually found herself enrolled in graduate school at Ohio State University. In 2003, Kirsten earned her MA in Sociology after defending her thesis about factors contributing to the decline of the Danish-American folk school movement in the US. She has been teaching sociology at Anoka/ Ramsey Community College since 2004. In 2018 her taste for adventure took her on a week solo motorcycle trip to the west coast to survey people's perceptions of feminism. Wednesday, October 26

Pastor Mark Granquist will present "Grundtvig and his relation to Danish Christianity."

Granquist will reflect on the nineteenth century, as Danish Christianity underwent a dramatic transformation, as the country and the culture encountered the stirrings of the Enlightenment and of the modern world. N.F.S. Grundtvig was an important, if controversial part of this transformation, along with a number of other figures, including the pietist leaders. Mark will discuss Grundtvig's place in Danish Christianity during his life and afterwards, and how he thought Christianity should be situated in the Church of Denmark. Mark A. Granquist is the Lloyd and Annelotte Svendsbye Professor of History of Christianity at Luther Seminary. Prior to 2007 he taught at St. Olaf College and Gustavus Adolphus College, St. Peter, MN. Since his ordination in 1988 he served in parish ministry or Lutheran higher education. He is a 1979 graduate of St. Olaf and received his M Div from Yale University Divinity School in 1984 and his PHD from University of Chicago Divinity School in 1992. He is editor of Luther Seminary journal Word & World and Journal of the Lutheran Historical Conference. He is the author of several books.

NATIONAL DANISH AMERICAN GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY TO HOLD OPEN HOUSE CELEBRATING 40TH ANNIVERSARY

Saturday, October 29: 1-4pm

Forty years ago, a group of individuals who were interested in researching their Danish ancestry gathered at the Danish American Center on Cedar Avenue to form a Danish genealogy group. The group has prospered and thrived and grown into the National Danish American Genealogical Society. The group now meets at the Danish American Center on West River Parkway in Minneapolis.

To celebrate this milestone, the group is hosting an open house on Saturday Oct. 29 from 1–4pm at the DAC.

A presentation will be made by Susan Jacobsen who will show and discuss the history of the Fredrick Lund prints which were recently donated by the genealogy group to the DAC.

DANISH GENEALOGY-ONE STEP WEBPAGES: A POTPOURRI OF GENEALOGICAL SEARCH TOOLS

Monday, October 24: 6:30pm

The One-Step website started out as an aid for finding passengers in the Ellis Island database. Shortly afterwards it was expanded to help with searching in the 1930 census. Over the years it has continued to evolve and today includes about 300 web-based tools divided into 16 separate categories ranging from genealogical searches to astronomical calculations to last-minute bidding on e-bay. This presentation will describe the range of tools available and give the highlights of each one.

Lecture will be presented by Stephen Morse, the creator of the One-Step Website for which he has received both the Lifetime Achievement Award and the Outstanding Contribution Award from the International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies, Award of Merit from the National Genealogical Society, first-ever Excellence Award from the Association of Professional Genealogists, and two awards that he cannot pronounce from Polish genealogical societies.

In his other life Morse is a computer professional with a doctorate degree in electrical engineering. He has held various research, development, and teaching positions, authored numerous technical papers, written four textbooks, and holds four patents. He is best known as the architect of the Intel 8086 (the granddaddy of today's Pentium processor), which sparked the PC revolution more than 40 years ago.
