It was so wonderful to see everyone at the recent annual meeting. The annual meeting is a chance for us all to reflect on the past year and celebrate the success that we've had as an organization. Preparation for the annual meeting involved a great deal of reflection on the past year. We looked at our level of activities, the amazing amount of volunteer hours that were contributed by membership, and we also took inventory of our financial situation. For those of you who were at the meeting, I hope you got a clear picture of the status of the DAC and some of the successes and possible challenges that we have going forward.

MEDISTERPØLSE CLASS

For many Danes, the juleaften meal is not complete without a serving of medisterpølse.

Come learn to make your own from 9:30am until we're all stuffed (the casings, not us), usually by noon. The class is limited to 16, fills quickly, and is on a first-come, first-served basis. Cooking instructions along with recipes for traditional Danish side dishes will be provided.

Deadline for registering is November 3 to give the butcher sufficient time to grind the pork. As the recipes are written for 5 pounds of meat, please order in increments of 5 pounds. Bring a bowl(s) large enough to hold all your raw meat and still add spices and broth, and get it all mixed together without spilling over the edge. Also bring a knife for mincing onions, and your own cutting board if you don't want to share. Bringing an apron is also recommended.

Cost is \$40 for members and \$50 for non-members, and the price for the pork will be approximately \$3.50 per pound. Spices, casings, onions and broth are provided.

LEAVES FROM THE LIBRARY

"Denmark to abolish [tax] on books to get more people reading" (Guardian, 8/20/2025).

This recent headline caught my eye and led me to research the matter.

According to Culture Minister Jakob Engel-Schmidt there is a growing "reading crisis" in Denmark (NY Times, 8/21/2025). I read numerous articles to understand how this reading crisis is manifested in a country with a 99% literacy rate. This rate applies generally to upper teens and beyond.

Apparently, in the land of Hygge, as elsewhere, kids' reading scores and their interest in reading have been declining for years, even prior to Covid. The government's greatest concern is for the literacy of younger generations. Children and young people increasingly reach for their digital devices rather than pick up a book; at the same time, schools demonstrate the primacy of digital reading by allowing and offering iPads in the classroom. Of course, there are other factors that affect reading: formal reading education only starts at 6 or 7 years old; competition from streaming services; the abundance of social media distractions, and more.

"But what's so bad about digital reading?" you may ask. In 2023, the University of Valencia (Spain) conducted a large metadata analysis that concluded "leisure digital reading does not pay off in terms of comprehension...as much as print reading," and "the relationship between leisure digital reading and text comprehension proved downright negative for primary and middle learners." Serious stuff.

The Danish government has implemented a raft of initiatives to counter the reading and comprehension slide, as well as to foster the joy of reading. Since 2019, the government has supported national, ongoing, book reading programs such as Every Word Counts, BOGlad [Book Happy], Joy of Reading, and school-public library collaborations, to the tune of over DKK 60 million.

The tax break on books is the government's most recent initiative. Denmark's 25% book tax is the highest in the world and is expected to be voted out in this month's budget at a cost of DKK330 million (\$51 million) per



annum. The goal is to make it easier for homes and libraries to get great books into children's hands.

In concert with the government, publishers have agreed to drop their prices by 20%. They will be under the scrutiny of Engel-Schmidt who will ensure their profits don't grow instead of prices falling.

My advice? Go visit your local—or DAC—library and check out a great book!

EASY ALMOND TORTE OR SONJA'S ALMOND TORTE

If you attended the annual meeting this year, you may have tasted this delicious dessert. As several of you inquired about the recipe, we are printing it so you can make it yourself.

Ingredients

2 eggs
¾ cup butter or margarine
1 ½ cups sugar
3 tsp or 1 T almond extract
½ tsp vanilla
1 ½ cups flour
1 pkg slivered almonds (8 to 10 oz)

Directions

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Line an 8 or 9 inch round pie pan with foil. Melt the butter or margarine and cream with most of the sugar. Save about ¼ cup. Beat in the eggs, almond extract, vanilla and flour. Pour mixture into the pan. Smooth out batter and sprinkle with the reserved ¼ cup sugar and slivered almonds. Bake for 35 to 40 minutes. Cool, peel foil off and slice. Goes well with fresh berries, whipped cream or ice cream.

Note: This is such an easy one bowl recipe. People often think this cake has marzipan.

THE DANEBO READING CIRCLE ENDS PROGRAM YEAR IN ICELAND

North Commons Classroom and on Zoom

The November selection is *Animal Life (Dýralíf)* by Auður Ava Ólafsdóttir (IS: Benedikt, 2020, 192 pages; translated by Brian FitzGibbon, New York: Black Cat [Grove Atlantic], 2022). This author of nine novels is a winner of many prizes including the Nordic Council Literature Prize.

She was born in Iceland and currently lives in Reykjavík. Ólafsdóttir is a professor of art history, a playwright and poet. Her novels have been translated into 34 languages. This is the fourth novel by this author selected by the Reading Circle. Because the action takes place during December, it is a perfect prelude to the pending holidays.

Discussion leader Lillian Jensen, joining via Zoom from her home in California, offers these thoughts about the book: "The idea for *Animal Life* came about when the Icelandic people voted in 2013 for their favorite word in Icelandic. The word most people thought was the most beautiful was ljósmóðir which means "mother of light" and is the Icelandic word for midwife.

"The main character and narrator, Dómhildur or Dýja, is a midwife who comes from a long line of midwives and lives in the apartment she inherited four years earlier from her Grandaunt Fífa (Dómhildur the first). Fífa was also a midwife who had a unique reputation for her unconventional methods. Dýja learns more about her aunt's life through transcripts and letters she discovers in the clutter of the apartment as a terrible storm races toward Reykjavík three days before Christmas. Conversations with her new neighbor and sister play a role in the narrative." Plan now to experience the trajectory of the storm and the story, then attend the hybrid meeting on November 16.

DANISH GENEALOGY

Crossing the Line: Historical Emigration Across the U.S.-Canadian Border

Monday, November 24 at 6:30 pm CST via Zoom

While (true or not) many of us may have a vivid mental image of our Danish ancestors disembarking from their trans-Atlantic voyage onto Ellis Island, we may not think much of how they actually got from there to their final destinations like Minnesota, Wisconsin and other states. Many immigrants, and indeed many Danes, actually made the passage into America by crossing through Canada and the Great Lakes. The U.S. and Canada share the longest international border in the world (approximately 5,500 miles or 8,900 km). Until the late 1800s, however, the border was totally open, with no regulation or monitoring. We'll talk about when the tracking started, what has been recorded, and where records can be found, as well as why we care and what we can learn.

Speaker Diana Crisman Smith has been researching, speaking, writing, and teaching for over six decades. She has particularly enjoyed researching her US, Canadian, and Danish ancestors.
