The Danish American Center supports and fosters Danish culture through education and the celebration of traditions, customs and history.

WHY FUNDRAISE?

At the Danish American Center, our mission is to celebrate and preserve Danish culture in America. While our 501(c)(3) status allows us to operate without paying federal income taxes, this privilege is not guaranteed—it must be earned through your active participation.

To remain a public charity rather than being reclassified as a private foundation, the IRS requires us to pass the "Public Support Test." Under the "33 1/3% rule," we must demonstrate that at least one-third of our total financial support comes from a broad base of the public, including individual donations, membership dues, and program fees. Falling short on this test could cost the DAC many thousands of dollars each year and would make donations to DAC no longer tax-deductible. Income generated from our rentals DOES NOT count towards this.

Why does this matter in 2026?

Tax Benefits for You: Starting in 2026, new tax laws allow nearly 90% of Americans to deduct charitable contributions (up to \$1,000 for individuals or \$2,000 for couples) even if they do not itemize.

Maintaining Our Status: If public support drops below the required threshold for two consecutive years, we could face reclassification, which brings stricter regulations and potential excise taxes.

By donating, attending fundraisers, taking part in our programs and activity groups, and maintaining your membership, you are providing the "public support" that protects our nonprofit status and keeps the DAC an important hub of Danish culture and traditions for now and the future.

NOTES FROM THE PRESIDENT

We are living in very uncertain times. The community in Minneapolis is unsettled, and we have watched for many days as our community has been targeted by law-enforcement for an immigration enforcement "surge."

At our most recent board meeting, we had a long discussion about what the role of the DAC should be in the current environment. Our organization was founded by immigrants as a way to network and support each other. It has been a social outlet, and a place where like-minded individuals could share stories of their shared heritage and traditions that have been passed down through the generations.

Our empathy is genuine. We are watching and reading accounts of other local immigrants who are living in Minnesota and being targeted for deportation in a legally questionable manner. I have been contacted by many members of the organization who recall stories of the German occupation of Denmark during World War II, and the parallels are frighteningly similar to the conditions we see today here at home. We have also seen the brutal killings of Renee Goode and Alex Pretti. These images have been

seared into our brains, and it adds an unbelievably large exclamation point to an unfathomable timeline.

The situation is taking both an emotional and an economic toll on our city of Minneapolis and the state of Minnesota at large. Parents and neighbors are watching out for each others' security in a way that most had never imagined that they ever would. Businesses in the city, as well as statewide, are feeling an economic impact from the drop in spending and foot traffic, and the inability for workers to safely get to and from work. The fear is palpable, and it is unlike anything most of us ever thought we would experience.

So, the question remains, "what can we do?" There are many from our organization who are already active within their immediate local communities, helping to directly support immigrants who are nervous and scared. For the DAC at large, however, this is very much uncharted territory. We have had several suggestions come to the board members. Among them would be some sort of Town-hall gathering where we could gather our membership and have an open forum to discuss what we can do.

Having a meeting obviously won't solve our problems, but it might help us chart a path forward. It may also serve as a welcome opportunity for like-minded individuals to gather and share stories and experiences. We will keep you posted. Feel free to reach out to me or any of the Board members if you want to talk.

We stand strong together as Danes, and we stand strong together with the city of Minneapolis.

DANEBO READING CIRCLE VISITS THE "BIG ISLAND"

Sunday, March 15: 1-3pm

This month the Reading Circle travels to the island everyone is talking about these days, reading Jane Smiley's historical tale of *The Greenlanders*, 1988, New York: Knopf, 558 pages. Leader Michelle Potter-Bacon will have background material and discussion items to distribute in advance and at the meeting.

According to the website [goodreads.com](https://www.goodreads.com): "Pulitzer Prize winner and bestselling author Jane Smiley's *The Greenlanders* is an enthralling novel in the epic tradition of the old Norse sagas. Set in the fourteenth century in Europe's most far-flung outpost, a land of glittering fjords, blasting winds, sun-warmed meadows, and high, dark mountains, *The Greenlanders* is the story of one family-proud landowner Asgeir Gunnarsson; his daughter Margret, whose willful independence leads her into passionate adultery and exile; and his son Gunnar, whose quest for knowledge is at the compelling center of this unforgettable book. Jane Smiley takes us into this world of farmers, priests, and lawspeakers, of hunts and feasts and long-standing feuds, and by an act of literary magic, makes a remote time, place, and people not only real but dear to us."

On Sunday, April 19, the group will discuss Danish author Solvej Balle's *On the Calculation of Volume I (Om udregning af rumfang I)*, 2020, 161 pages; translated into English by Barbara J. Haveland, 2024, New Directions Publishing (New York). This novel is the first part of a seven-volume series. The New York Times described the novel as "the story of Tara Setler, an antiquarian bookseller, who wakes up one morning to find she is endlessly reliving the same day: the 18th of November. How, the novel asks, might she regain a future? As Setler explores her everlasting present, she confronts the world's finitude and rediscovers the texture of everyday life." The series has become an international success and has been translated into

multiple languages. In 2022, the Nordic Council awarded its Literature Prize to the first three volumes. The English edition was longlisted for a National Book Award and shortlisted for the International Booker Prize. Six volumes have been released in Danish, and the first three are currently available in English. Born in 1962, Solvej Balle currently lives on the Danish island of Ærø.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR FRIENDS AT MWMO: WINTER SAFETY ISN'T JUST ABOUT SALT

Winter in Minnesota means ice. Ice means salt. *And salt doesn't disappear when the snow melts.*

Each winter, Minnesota spreads hundreds of thousands of tons of road salt across sidewalks, parking lots, and streets to keep people safe. It works, but there's a catch.



Once salt dissolves, it turns into chloride, a pollutant that never breaks down. It moves through storm drains and soil, straight into our lakes, rivers, and groundwater. That's a big deal for the Mississippi River, which supplies drinking water, supports wildlife, and anchors recreation across the Twin Cities.

The Mississippi Watershed Management Organization (MWMO) is a local government agency working to protect the Mississippi River and the urban land around it, where stormwater drains directly into the river. Through partnerships with residents, businesses, and other local governments, we can reduce pollution before it reaches the water, because preventing pollution is far easier and cheaper than trying to remove it later.

Here's the scale of the salt problem:

Just one teaspoon of salt can permanently pollute five gallons of freshwater. Minnesota uses about 445,000 tons of road salt each year. Roughly 78% of that salt ends up in our water. Sixty-seven bodies of water in Minnesota are already impaired by chloride. Here's the surprising part: more salt doesn't actually make surfaces safer. Salt works best within a specific temperature range and when it's applied sparingly. Over-salting can create slippery brine, waste money, and make ice worse when temperatures drop. Smarter salting keeps people safer and protects water— and small changes add up. You can help by shoveling early, using less salt (a coffee-mug amount covers about 10 sidewalk squares), and sweeping up leftover salt after ice melts. Property owners and businesses can hire Smart Salting-certified contractors or take free certification training through the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency.

Communities are stepping up, too, by investing in smart plow technology, designing spaces to reduce ice buildup, and supporting policies that encourage safer, lower-salt winter maintenance. Winter safety and clean water aren't competing goals. When we salt smarter, we protect our neighbors today and revitalize the Mississippi River for generations to come.
